



### Kansas Native Education Legislation

#### 1884

Kansas becomes home to an Indian boarding school, United States Industrial Training School, soon known as the Haskell Institute and later established as Haskell Indian Nations University.

#### 2011

Kansas opens the Native American Affairs Office under the Office of the Governor.

#### 2013

The Kansas Legislature grants high school diplomas to students completing high school graduation requirements who are in the custody of federally recognized Indian tribes.

#### 2018

The Department of **Education approves Kansas** state plan to implement the Every Student Succeeds Act.
