



New Mexico Native Education Legislation

1975

Legislators create the Indian Education Division at the NM Department of Education.

1988

The NM Indian **Education Act** establishes and provides funding for the Assistant Secretary of Indian Education.

2004

New Mexico integrates Native of Education languages into the Bilingual Education Act, providing resources to Native students.

2017

The Department approves the NM state plan to implement the **Every Student** Succeeds Act.

2019

Legislators authorize new funding to support bilingual and multicultural education in rural schools.

2023

H.B. 148 requires the Early Childhood Education and Care Department to contract with tribes to conduct early learning programs

2023

H.B 280 creates and funds two American Indian Education Technical Assistance Centers

2023

H.B. 198 makes BIEfunded schools eligible for two of the state's technical education funding streams.
