Where Do Native Students Attend School?c









2005

Washington OSPI develops and encourages school districts to adopt Native culture and history curriculum.

2013

Washington creates state-tribal compacts to allow tribes to operate and run schools in tribal communities.

2015

State legislators pass a law requiring tribal sovereignty curriculum to be taught within the state's public schools.

2018

The Department of **Education approves** the Washington state plan to implement the Every **Student Succeeds**

2020

Washington affirms the right of Native students to where tribal regalia at graduation.

2021

Washington bans Native-American themes mascots and names in public schools.
